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### **Trump Still on Top - Cruz Rises in Michigan** *(Trump 42% - Cruz 19% - Rubio 15% - Kasich 14%)*

EAST LANSING, Michigan --- Donald Trump (42%) increased his lead over Texas U.S. Senator Ted Cruz (19%), Florida U.S. Senator Marco Rubio (15%), Ohio Governor John Kasich (14%), and Dr. Ben Carson (5%) while 1% are for someone else and 5% are undecided according to the latest Mitchell/FOX 2 Detroit - Michigan Poll conducted last night after the results of the Super Tuesday primaries and caucuses were known, after Trump's "softer side" press conference, and after Dr. Ben Carson said he was not going to debate in Detroit tonight.

The IVR (Interactive Voice Response) automated survey of 643 likely March 8, 2016 Michigan Republican Presidential Primary voters was conducted by Mitchell Research & Communications on Wednesday, March 2, 2016 and has a Margin of Error of + or - 3.86% at the 95% level of confidence.

"There were several changes resulting from Super Tuesday including a small bump up in Trump's support (42%) and a big change in the second spot as Cruz (19%) and Rubio (15%) changed places and percentages. Cruz moved up 5% and Rubio dropped 4%. Kasich (14%) moved up 2% and was also helped by the awareness that Carson was not debating and that he 'could not see a path forward' for his campaign. It appears that Trump's more conciliatory style in his Tuesday night press conference, Cruz's four victories, and Rubio's failure to meet expectations have changed the race - at least until the Fox News Channel Debate in Detroit tonight," Steve Mitchell, CEO of Mitchell Research & Communications said.

Before a more thorough breakout by demographics, there was some key information in the poll:

- Trump continues to be stronger with men (42%) than women (41%), but Trump's toned down rhetoric on Tuesday helped him increase his support by six percentage points with women from last night (35%). This increase in support from women offsets his drop of 5% among men since last week when he was at 47%.
- Sixty-four percent of Trump voters strongly agree that they "are mad as hell and they won't take it anymore." Supporters of none of the other candidates reach more than 50% strong agreement on that statement. Second are Cruz supporters (43%). Clearly, the angry voters support these two candidates.

- Voters are solidifying behind their candidates. Trump (85%) and Cruz (78%) are also the two candidates whose supporters say they will definitely vote for them. About two-of-three Rubio voters (71%) and Kasich voters (69%) are “definitely” voting for them.
- We asked voters if they would identify themselves as Evangelical Christians to see who is winning with that demographic group in Michigan. Trump (30%) trails Cruz (31%). One of the group that Rubio has dropped with is this group where he has gone from 20% last night to 14% tonight with that group.
- We also wanted to see if the disagreement Trump had with Pope Francis would impact Trump’s support with Roman Catholics and found that it clearly did not. Trump (52%) leads Rubio (16%) Kasich (14%) and Cruz (11%) with Catholics. Trump (41%) is stronger with non-church goers and weakest with Protestants (33% of the vote). Cruz is getting 25% of Protestants.

The following data show results by demographics:

By age:

- Among 18-39 year olds it is Trump (35%), Rubio (15%), Cruz (37%), Kasich (4%), and Carson (4%).
- Among 40-49 year olds it is Trump (40%), Rubio (15%), Cruz (17%), Kasich (7%), and Carson (6%).
- Among 50-59 year olds it is Trump (44%), Cruz (17%), Rubio (11%), Kasich (12%), and Carson (5%).
- Among 60-69 year olds it is Trump (39%), Rubio (11%), Cruz (20%), Kasich (18%), and Carson (2%).
- Among 70 and older it is Trump (46%), Rubio (14%), Kasich (16%), Cruz (10%), and Carson (10%).

By gender:

- Among men it is Trump (42%), Cruz (25%), Rubio (13%), Kasich (14%), and Carson (4%).
- Among women it is Trump (41%) Rubio (18%), Cruz (13%), Kasich (14%), and Carson (6%).

By area:

- In Wayne County, it is Trump (44%) Rubio (9%), Kasich (19%), Cruz (19%), and Carson (5%).
- In Oakland, it is Trump (40%), Cruz (14%), Rubio (20%), Kasich (14%), and Carson (7%).
- In Macomb, it is Trump (54%) Kasich (11%), Rubio (11%), Cruz (11%), and Carson (1%).
- In Saginaw, Flint, Saginaw, Bay City, Midland, the Thumb, it is Trump (41%), Rubio (22%), Cruz (22%), Carson (3%) and Kasich (11%),
- In Washtenaw, Monroe, Mid-Michigan, it is Trump (45%), Rubio (15%), Kasich (15%), Carson (3%), and Cruz (22%).
- In West Michigan, it is Trump (33%), Rubio (14%), Cruz (25%), Carson (9%), and Kasich (15%).
- In Northern MI/Upper Peninsula, it is Trump (44%), Cruz (22%), Rubio (13%), Kasich (11%) and Carson (3%).

“Trump continues to hold a strong lead in Michigan. The key question tonight is how Trump will respond to what should be a barrage of attacks by Cruz and Rubio. Will he be the softer Trump we saw Tuesday night, or will he revert to the “nasty” Trump of the last two debates? Cruz has clearly replaced Rubio in second place, but it is still hard to see him overtaking Trump in Michigan,” Mitchell concluded.

### **Methodology:**

Mitchell Research & Communications used a sample of likely voters in the November 2016 Michigan General Election. Our goal is to spread as wide a net as possible to assure we survey voters who may not have voted in primary elections before. A quadruple filter was used to determine that we were surveying only likely Republican Party Primary voters.

- First voters had to say they were registered voters. If they were not, the phone call ended.
- Then, they were asked if they were definitely voting, probably voting, not sure yet, or definitely not voting in the November General Election. If they were “definitely not voting” the phone call ended.
- Then they were asked if they were definitely voting, probably voting, not sure yet, definitely not voting, or if they had already voted by absentee ballot in the March 8<sup>th</sup> Presidential Primary. If they were “definitely not voting” the call ended.
- Finally, they were informed that they could only vote in on party’s primary, not in both. They were asked if they were voting in the Democratic Party Primary, the Republican Party Primary, or if they were not sure. If respondents said “Democratic” or “not sure” the call ended, so we were only polling those who said they were voting in the Republican Party Primary Election.

We asked Mark Grebner of Practical Political Consulting, considered to be the top list vendor and leading voter demographer in Michigan, and the person who supplied us with our sample, to give us his estimate on voter turnout by age, gender, and race.

We compared final results to determine if the data needed to be weighed to reflect the demographics of the likely voters. In this poll, weighting was done by gender because the sample had a higher percentage of women than we anticipate.

Federal law only permits us to call land lines. Because likely Primary voters are older, almost six-in-ten (59%) are 60 or older and eight-in-ten (81%) are older than 50, there are sufficient land line voters to get an accurate sample. We do not have to make any assumptions of likely voter turnout.
